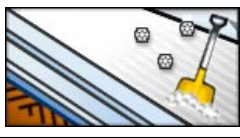
Primary Avalanche Danger



Description:
There is still a small chance of small loose wet slides due to the temperatures. While not a major scare factor, just think about where you might end up if you were to lose your footing above a place you'd rather not visit. If the snow is wet and slushy it's going to want to act like water and flow downhill.



Current Snowpack Conditions



For the most part, there is a stable and consolidated snow pack with a predominance of wet grains. The permanent snow line has retreated for the most part to above 2000m and the Glacial regions.

Westerly winds will continue for a time and slowly decrease later on Tuesday/Wednesday morning. Some scattered rain, mostly in the west clearing by Tuesday morning and a high freezing level.
